Joanna Lumley: Britain should lead the way in ending animal experiments

ach year nearly 3.5 million animals are subjected to experiments in British laboratories, yet advances in medical research methods could bring this to an end. Many innovative breakthroughs, including artificial intelligence, the use of human cells or tissues, organ-on-a-chip and stem cell technology, have been pioneered by scientists in British labs.

The animal-free revolution cuts experiment times, makes research cheaper and, crucially, produces more reliable data on potential drugs to treat and cure deadly diseases from cancer to Alzheimer's.

Much of the British public cares immensely, as I do, for the welfare of all animals. The government says it does, too. In the recent <u>Queen's Speech</u> it outlined how it will promote higher standards of animal wellbeing, and acknowledged that animals can experience joy and pleasure as well as pain and suffering.

But for all the good intentions, it overlooks the suffering that continues to take place in British laboratories.

Animal lovers will be shocked to learn that 90 per cent of new medicines that look promising in animal tests fail in human clinical trials. Significant differences in our genetic make-up mean that data from animal experiments does not necessarily translate to people.

The speed at which Covid vaccines were developed using the latest alternative methods saw human trials conducted in parallel with, and sometimes ahead of, animal tests. However, many animal-free scientists complain that to have their research into diseases such as diabetes, breast cancer and dementia peer-reviewed in one of the esteemed science journals, they must show they also tested on animals.

The charity Animal Free Research UK is calling on the government to spearhead the modernisation of medical research. In addition to the ethical argument, supporting the development and take-up of animal-free methods has huge potential for the economy. For example, the global 3D cell culture market was estimated to be worth £7.3 billion in 2020, rising to £10.4 billion by 2025.

Britain is already home to world-leading <u>universities</u> and pharmaceutical companies, and we are well placed to excel in this field. Other nations are stealing a march on us. The Dutch

government has embraced the need for animal-free innovation. The US Environmental Protection Agency has committed to stop funding and requesting tests on mammals by 2035. If Britain is to achieve its ambition of becoming a global science superpower, we must lead the way in replacing animals with high-tech, non-animal methods.

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What biological or medical expertise does this woman have, what PhD or experience in the field of animal testing does she hold? As of now there is no AI or tissue culture experiment that can replace animal modelling for drug testing. 95+% of tests are conducted on mice and rats. Dogs and non-human primates are only utilized in advanced preclinical testing where years of research have advanced medicinal candidates to levels of safety that these animals are used to measure how drugs are metabolized and excreted. These animals are treated extremely well and not subjected to stress. How would we have arrived at the rapid clinical trial results of the current Covid vaccines, which have gone on to protect hundreds of millions of lives, without the necessary validation of efficacy in animal models?
